Thoughts from Father Totton

This weekend we commemorate the 244^{th} anniversary of the signing of the *Declaration of Independence* – what has traditionally been reckoned the birth of our Nation, the United States of America. Of course, it has always been simplistic to think in terms of instant change, and we must remember that the brave men whose names underscore that document were, like all men, complicated human beings



responding to challenging times and, perhaps with mixed motives. Nevertheless, their willingness to declare independence from the British crown, set in motion a series of events that would eventually change the world and the means of government which we would entrust to protect rights which God had bestowed upon all people, among them, "Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness." Today, these same founding fathers are being scrutinized and judged according to standards to which 21st century citizens subscribe, but which may not have been as evident in their time. To be sure, the founding fathers were not saints, but they were courageous and virtuous men inasmuch as they chose to stand up to tyranny and plot a course for freedom! We know that July 4, 1776 marked a beginning of a new nation which would endure its own struggles and challenges. Their first challenge, of course was backing their monumental words with the might to take up arms against the British Empire. Following that, they had to find ways to tweak our form of government, eventually resulting some 13 years later, in the Constitution of the United States. It wouldn't be until 70 years after that, that we finally addressed, as a nation, the question of slavery.

This is all evidence that our nation, begun 244 years ago which we proudly celebrate on this weekend, is a work in progress. As a people, we should be willing and able to address the past and correct errors and missteps where they have happened. This requires a reasonable

understanding of history (not only of the founding documents, but of the thought of classical thinkers upon which they are based) *and* a recognition of the role that our Christian Faith has played in understanding these texts.
