Thoughts by Father Benjamin Fenton

People often complain about 'Catholic guilt', and assume, based on Nietzschian principles for the most part, that Catholicism, God, comes to take something away

If God takes things from us, we can be assured that it is to make us into something better. It is preferable to BE more than to HAVE more. That's obvious... right? The virtues are a beautiful, positive side of our faith. To win heaven, to become holy, to become ourselves, we must become virtuous. These are actions that we repeat and that grow to be stronger in us – just like muscles. Virtue literally means strength. The Cardinal virtues are four crucial virtues upon which all of the other ones hinge – **Prudence**, meaning applying the rules to real life situations. If your wife is giving birth in your car, you apply the law to the situation and step on the gas – and when you reach an intersection you slow all the way down and stop, so that you can pass without causing an accident. That's prudence – the writer of the law would have done the same.

Justice is about giving God what he deserves – so if we arrive late for Mass, or are distracted at Mass, we commit an injustice. Or it involves giving our neighbor what they deserve – so hoarding wealth to ourselves, cheating others, bullying, etc, are forms of injustice.

Temperance is the moderation of our lower appetites, referring to food, sleep and for those who are married, making love. These pleasurable aspects of life must be engaged in and ordered reasonably, because otherwise they can obstruct our human dignity and leave us out of control.

Fortitude involves doing the right thing even when it is arduous to do so – a judge who condemns a mob boss to jail or to death, even when he knows they will come after him, acts with heroic fortitude. A mom who grounds her children despite the temper tantrums she can expect, acts with fortitude.

How can you apply these virtues to your life?
